Thank you for your interest in the Practical Nursing program. The program is a twelve (12) month, day program. Two (2) cohorts will be admitted each year (one in January and one in July). Attached is the *Recommended Course Sequence* which details the terms and courses. Admission to the Practical Nursing Program is <u>highly competitive</u>. We anticipate that the number of interested candidates will exceed the number of seats available.

The <u>pre-screening</u> process establishes eligibility for admission into the Practical Nursing
Program. You must:
☐ have an official high school transcript or GED diploma with scores.
☐ if you are a high school graduate from a foreign country or have an out-of-state GED, obtain a
Certificate of Preliminary (CPE) Education from the Pennsylvania Department of Education.
\square be at least 17 years old.
☐ be a U. S. citizen, permanent resident, or eligible non-citizen.
Applicants who meet the following requirements are considered for admission (meeting the
requirements is not a guarantee of admission into the program):
1. Meet the pre-screening requirements listed above.
2. Complete an application.
3. To qualify for admission into the Practical Nursing program, students must complete (5) credits of
Anatomy and
Physiology (or the equivalent of Anatomy & Physiology I and Anatomy & Physiology II) and
achieve a grade of C or higher, which can be completed at P.I.T. or transferred from a Middle
States Accredited institution.
4. Complete AHT180 TEAS Smartprep course with a grade of C or higher or obtain a score of <i>PROFICIENT</i> or higher on the TEAS exam withing the last 2 years.
5. Submit official college or post-secondary education transcripts, if applicable.
6. Satisfactory background check, including a criminal record check and child abuse clearance
for every state lived in within past 10 years. An FBI background check is required.
7. Completion of satisfactory drug screening.
8. Satisfactory physical examination including immunizations, titers, TdaP, and tuberculosis screening
9. IF tuberculosis screening is positive, Chest X-ray with a doctor's note within last 5 years is required
10. CPR- Adult, Infant, child (AHA BLS Provider is recommended)
11 Flu vaccine

Clinical Health Programs Medical Marijuana Procedure and Acknowledgement

The Pennsylvania Department of Health has implemented the Pennsylvania Medical Marijuana Program, a component of the Medical Marijuana Act (MMA) that was signed as law on April 17, 2016. This program provides access to medical marijuana for patients with serious medical conditions as defined by the Pennsylvania Department of Health.

Currently, the federal government regulates drugs through the Controlled Substances Act, which does not recognize the difference between medical and recreational use of marijuana. Under federal law, marijuana is a Schedule 1 controlled substance, which means that it is considered to have no medical value. Practitioners may not prescribe marijuana for medical use under federal law.

Students entering any Clinical Health Programs are required to have laboratory screenings for drugs and alcohol upon admission to the clinical phase of the program and on a yearly basis while participating in the clinical experiences. As per current policy, if the results are positive, the student will be dismissed from the program.

Students using medical marijuana will not be eligible for clinical placement in any P.I.T. clinical program, due to the current discrepancy between state and federal law regarding Drug Free Work Place Act and the MMA. Businesses who are not in compliance with federal law are at risk for criminal or civil charges; and additionally may find issue with eligibility for federal contracts and grants.

Additionally, Pennsylvania's Medical Marijuana statute specifically provides that an employer does not have to accommodate an individual in a safety sensitive position if that person is under the influence of medical marijuana. Most positions involving direct patient care will be considered safety sensitive positions.

Students should also understand that under current Pennsylvania State Board law, many health career licensing boards require drug screening at the time of application for licensure. Similarly, most health care employers will perform routine drug screening as a condition for employment, as these positions involve direct patient care, and are considered safety sensitive positions. This discrepancy between federal and state law allows our clinical partners to deny student placement for clinical experiences and the State of Pennsylvania to deny licensure.

In order to be transparent with this entire process, we recognize our responsibility to fully inform students of P.I.T.'s procedure regarding the use of medical marijuana. Due to current laws we cannot provide admission to the clinical phase in any of our Clinical Health Programs and students who have been admitted and are later to be found positive for medical marijuana will be removed.

Pennsylvania Institute of Technology Practical Nursing Program FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

1. What is the Practical Nursing (PN) Program?

The PN Program is a Certificate Program and is designed to prepare the student for a successful nursing career and employment in the healthcare field, to facilitate personal growth experience, and to provide Registered Nurse program transfer opportunities.

2. What are the requirements for admission into the PN Program and who is responsible for paying for the cost, if any?

See attached MINIMUM ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS DECLARATION document.

3. Is the PN Program approved?

Yes. The program is approved by the Pennsylvania State Board of Nursing.

4. Will criminal history prevent acceptance into the program?

It depends on the specific details of the criminal history. One misdemeanor may not prelude acceptance into the program while more than one and/or a felony conviction usually does. To participate in clinical experiences a "no record" status must be reported on child abuse background checks, therefore, a history of child abuse precludes acceptance into the program.

If there is an "arrest" or "charge" listed on your criminal background check that does not have the "disposition" you will be required to provide official documents such as criminal background check from that state.

The Pennsylvania State Board of Nursing requires that the program inform applicants that the State Board of Nursing:

- □ may deny a license or the privilege of sitting for licensing examination to an applicant who has been convicted* of a felonious act prohibited by the act of April 14, 1972 (P.L.233, No.64) known as "The Controlled Substance, Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act," or convicted of a felony related to controlled substance in a court of law of the United States or any other state, territory or country unless:
- ☐ may refuse a license in any case where the board finds the applicant:
 - (1) Is guilty of gross immorality.
 - (2) Is unfit or incompetent by reason of negligence, habits, or other causes.
 - (3) Has been convicted of a felony or a crime of moral turpitude, or been dishonorably discharged or discharged under circumstances amounting to dishonorable discharge from the military.

(4) Is addicted to alcohol or is addicted to hallucinogenic or narcotic drugs or other drugs which tend to impair judgment or coordination, or if he or she is judged to be mentally incompetent.

If the answer is yes to either one of the above questions you may have difficulty obtaining a license in Pennsylvania.

Deceit in the admission process is cause for dismissal from the program.

5. Are there any Pre-requisites?

Yes, to qualify for admission into the Practical Nursing program, students must complete and achieve a grade of C or higher for (5) credits of Anatomy and Physiology (or the equivalent of Anatomy & Physiology I and Anatomy & Physiology II), which can be completed at. P.I.T. or transferred from a Middle States Accredited Institution. Students must also complete AHT180 TEAS SmartPrep course with a C or higher which is completed at P.I.T or a score of **PROFICIENT** (58.7) or higher on the TEAS exam within two years of program entry.

6. How many credit hours is the program and how long will it take to complete the program? Are the credits transferable to another school or college?

The curriculum is comprised of 50 nursing credits. The curriculum is divided into 4 terms of instruction for a total of 1500 hours. The full-time day program is a twelve (12) month program; the possibility of evening/weekend clinical rotations exists. Credits earned are not necessarily transferable to another school or college.

There are many opportunities for Licensed Practical Nurses to move up the educational ladder to obtain further specialty certifications or become a Registered Nurse. Both associate degree and bachelor's degree programs are available. Many even offer credit for your practical nursing education.

^{*}The term "convicted" includes a judgment, found guilty by a judge or jury, pleaded guilty or nolo contendere, received probation without verdict, disposition in lieu of trial or Accelerated Rehabilitative Disposition.

7. What are the roles and responsibilities of a licensed practical nurse?

Nursing is an art and science dedicated to meeting the healthcare needs of individuals of all ages and communities. Licensed practical nurses (LPNs) provide healthcare in a variety of settings such as long-term care facilities, hospitals, physician's offices, homes, rehabilitation facilities, and clinics. LPNs work under the supervision of a licensed professional (registered) nurse, a licensed physician, or a licensed dentist.

The nursing actions performed by LPNs are extensive. The list includes, but is not limited to, provide fundamental care, collect client information and data, perform routine monitoring, administer medications, enteral feedings, and intravenous therapy, and perform wound care, dressing changes, and respiratory treatments. LPNs provide health teaching, monitor effectiveness of treatments, and document data, actions, and responses. LPNs are integral members of the healthcare team working together to assist the individual or family in the prevention of illness, restoration of health or adaptation to illness, and achievement of comfort.

8. Is there tutoring available?

P.I.T. is organized for student success. There are opportunities for peer, group, and private tutoring in our Student Resource Center, Student Innovation Center, Nursing instructors will be available for academic advising, tutoring, guidance, and support of nursing students.

9. What types of student services are available on campus?

Student Services provides academic support and career and transfer counseling as well as referral to social and community services. Other student services available include: cafeteria, student lounge, and student lockers. P. I. T. van service between P.I.T. and SEPTA's 101 Trolley Station at Providence Road and State Road is available.

10. Will I receive a license immediately upon completion of the PN program?

No. Graduation from the PN program qualifies you to <u>apply</u> for a license and apply to take the NCLEX-PN[®] (National Council of Licensure Examination-Practical Nursing). You must apply to the State Board of Nursing <u>and</u> register for the examination. The State Board of Nursing determines if you are eligible to take the examination. When you pass NCLEX-PN[®] you will be issued a license.

11. What sites are used for clinical learning experience? Is transportation provided to and from the clinical sites?

Clinical environments are hospitals, nursing homes, assisted living, acute care facilities, community centers, pediatric facilities, correctional facilities, and elementary schools. Clinical also occurs on campus in the Simulation lab and may also occur online with a Virtual client and assignments. Negotiations for additional clinical environments for clinical learning experiences are ongoing. The possibility of evening/weekend clinical rotations exists. Clinical sites are not limited to Delaware County, and maybe out of state. Students are responsible for their own transportation. Clinical site placement is decided by nursing faculty. Requests for clinical site placement with peers or at specific agency will not be honored.

12. What type of patient/patients do student nurses care for during clinical learning experiences?

The Pennsylvania State Board of Nursing requires that clinical learning experiences provide opportunities for students to care for men, women, and children in a variety of age groups. Therefore, each student will be assigned to (and expected to) care for men, women, and children with a variety of health problems. Students are not permitted to refuse a patient care assignment.

13. What resources are available to help fund my nursing education?

Financial aid is available for those students who qualify, through federal, state, institutional, and special programs. Student loans are available. Some employers offer

tuition forgiveness (repay outstanding loans for education) programs in exchange for

employment. There are also professional and community organizations that offer

scholarships to nursing students. For further information on federal, state or college aid

14. Are there computer requirements for the nursing program?

Yes. All exams that are given online are recorded and monitored live via a Webcam. In addition, virtual patients can only be accessed through a laptop or desktop. iPads and smart phones can be used for lecture but are not compatible with other products, learning platforms, and software.

15. Is my acceptance into the program guaranteed?

Acceptance into the Practical nursing program is a highly competitive process with limited seating available. All perspective students must ensure that they have all minimum admission requirements met by the deadline prior to beginning the program.

16. Can I really lose my spot in the program before being accepted?

Since the practical nursing program is so competitive, we rely on indicators that demonstrate a student the exhibits the types of behaviors necessary to be a safe and competent nurse. This means we are in constant communication with P.I.T. faculty and staff across different areas of the college and receive reports of positive and negative interactions. Students who exhibit behaviors against our standards of professional conduct and treat members of the college community with aggressive, abusive, or disruptive behavior can be removed from consideration from the nursing program before acceptances has been extended. This includes interactions with admissions, academic support, faculty outside of the nursing program and staff members of the college. Additionally, students found to be breaking campus policies and rules, such as ignoring parking lot signage, or using profane language can be removed consideration at the discretion of the program director.



Hepatitis B Declination Form

- I understand that I should give careful consideration to the mental and physical demands of the program prior to beginning the program.
- I understand that I must provide proof of documentation of a COVID vaccination, or I cannot attend clinical which will result in failure of the course.
- I understand that I must provide proof of documentation of a seasonal flu vaccine, or I cannot attend clinical which will result in failure of the course.

ESSENTIAL QUALIFICATIONS

All individuals, including persons with disabilities, who apply for admission to the Nursing program must be able to perform specific essential functions with or without reasonable accommodation. The following outlines the abilities and behavioral characteristics necessary for the student to be admitted to, continue in, and graduate from, the Nursing program at PIT (Pennsylvania Institute of Technology). These essential qualifications are standards of admission. The applicant should carefully review the essential qualifications for the program and ask questions if not familiar with the activities or functions listed. The applicant must decide if he or she has any limitations that may restrict or interfere with the satisfactory performance of any of the requirements. It is the applicant's responsibility to meet these essential qualifications if accepted into the program. The applicant should consult with the program director to discuss any individual situation if he or she may not be able to meet these essential qualifications. Requests for reasonable accommodation will be considered. Contact the program director if you have any questions about this matter.

Communication

- 1. Communicate verbally using clear and effective English.
- 2. Write legibly in clear and effective English using correct grammar, punctuation, and spelling.
- 3. Quickly and accurately comprehend and follow verbal instructions in English.
- 4. Quickly and accurately read, comprehend, and follow written instructions in English.
- 5. Actively participate in group discussions
- 6. Use communication equipment telephone, computer, other device used for communication.

Physical Skills

- 1. Possess fine and gross skills sufficient to handle equipment and provide safe and effective patient care.
- 2. Exert maximum physical force to lift, push, pull or carry objects up to 35 pounds (oxygen cylinders, beds, patients, or any other type of equipment) as indicated by Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) and National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) Guidelines (9/2021)
- 3. Move quickly, freely, and safely around the assigned work area and patient care settings.
- 4. Sustain professional activities for up to 8 or more hours.
- 5. Reach above shoulder level (to manipulate equipment)
- 6. Reach below waist level (to manipulate equipment)
- 7. Move upper and lower extremities, back, hips, and knees without restriction bend, stoop, and squat.
- 8. Keep hand and arm steady while moving arm or while holding arm and hand in one position.
- 9. Make precisely coordinated movements of the fingers of one or both hands to grasp, manipulate, or assemble very small objects.
- 10. Coordinate two or more limbs (for example, two arms, two legs, or one leg and one arm) while sitting, standing, or lying down.

 - c. Read fine print and handwriting.
- 3. Detect and distinguish odors from clients and environment.
- 4. Distinguish textures, degrees of firmness, temperature differences, pulse rate and vibrations; feel anatomical landmarks and veins.
- 5. Distinguish and describe the patient's affect, body language, and physical responses that the patient cannot verbally relay (i.e., facial expressions, sweating, trembling, color change, bleeding, etc.)

Intellectual, Cognitive, and Critical Thinking Skills

- 1. Concentrate on a task over a period of time without being distracted.
- 2. Apply principles of critical, logical thinking to define problems, collect data, establish facts, and draw sensible and valid conclusions.
- 3. Combine pieces of information to form general rules or conclusions (includes finding a relationship among unrelated events).
- 4. Perform multiple tasks simultaneously.
- 5. Arrange things or actions in a certain order or pattern according to a specific rule or set of rules (alphabetize)
- 6. Integrate information quickly, consistently, accurately, especially in an emergent situation.

Behavioral / Social Skills / Ethics

- 1. Display a prominent level of professionalism and discretion in all actions and communication (written, oral and electronic) with all members of staff, faculty, and the public.
- 2. Function effectively and display integrity, poise, and emotional stability under stress (emergency, critical, or dangerous situations) in actions with all (peers, patients, staff, and faculty)
- 3. Use team approach to carry out responsibilities.
- 4. Respond to all persons sensitively and with respect for cultural diversity.
- 5. Maintain general good health and self-care.
- 6. Display flexibility and adapt to changing environments.
- 7. Manage time effectively.
- 8. Accept responsibility for own behavior and be forthright about errors or uncertainty.
- 9. Refuse to perform or participate in any illegal, unethical, or incompetent acts, to include but not limited to the following: falsifying or knowingly making incorrect entries into a patient's record or related document; copying other student's written assignments; cheating on a quiz or examination; making untrue statements to a faculty member or administrator.
- 10. Monitor/assess performance of self, other individuals, or organizations to make improvements or take corrective action.
- 11. Capable of developing mature sensitive and effective relationships (with patients, staff, coworkers, etc.)
- 12. Follows all faculty, staff, and college rules regulations and instructions at all times.

LEGAL QUALIFICATIONS

Legal Qualifications for Nursing Programs – Students entering nursing programs will be required to undergo an annual Pennsylvania Child Abuse History Clearance, FBI Check, and State Police Criminal Record Check. These clearances will be due yearly, and due dates will vary by campus, and program of admission. No student will be admitted or retained in the program with a disqualifying criminal history or child abuse clearance.

Legal Limitation on Qualification for Licensure - The Professional Nursing Law of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania states that the Board of Nursing may refuse to license a person who has been found guilty or pleaded guilty to felony charges. The application for licensure asks, "Have you been convicted * of a misdemeanor, felony; felonious act; an illegal act associated with alcohol, an illegal act associated with substance abuse(s)?"

*Convicted includes judgment; admission of guilt; pleas of nolo contendere; probation without verdict; incomplete ARD.

Applicants should be aware of these limitations prior to entering the nursing programs. Practice of deceit in the application procedure is cause for dismissal from the program.

GUIDELINES FOR STUDENT CONDUCT

Standards of Professional Conduct

The nursing faculty believes that standards of professional conduct are an inherent part of professional socialization and expects students enrolled in the nursing program to adhere to the standards. Students practice within the boundaries of the Pennsylvania State Board Nurse Practice Act, the guidelines of the Pennsylvania Institute of Technology Student Handbooks, and the policies and regulations of the healthcare agency where they are assigned for clinical learning.

The use of abusive language or disruptive behavior directed toward peers, staff, faculty, or clinical agency personnel will not be tolerated and may result in disciplinary action up to and including dismissal from the program. Such behavior is inconsistent with professional standards and inappropriate for students aspiring to a career in nursing. The Director and/or instructor will complete a Student Performance Improvement Plan (SPIP) or Practical Nursing Incident Report form describing behavior and documenting the planned corrective actions to be taken.

Nursing students engaging in this misconduct are subject to immediate removal from setting and further disciplinary action.

Standards of Professional Conduct include:

- Confidentiality: Respects the privacy of clients and respects privileged information. Adheres to HIPAA.
- Accountability: Is answerable for one's action; answers to self, the client, the profession, and the institution.
- Responsibility: Executes duties associated with the nurse's particular role. Recognizes own limitations and need for appropriate assistance from others.
- Agency's Policies and Procedures: Is familiar with and adheres to the agency policies and procedures.
- Veracity: is honest and truthful.
- Punctuality and Promptness: Is on time for all classroom, laboratory, and clinical assignments.
- Dependability: Is trustworthy and reliable.
- Respect: Treats others with consideration and courtesy. Utilizes assertive (not-aggressive) communication skills. Refrains from obscene language and uses a respectful tone with faculty, staff, peers, and community members.
- Professional Appearance: Adheres to established dress code in clinical and maintains professional appearance if non-clinical dress permitted.
- Ethical: Adheres to codes of ethics for nurses (National Association of Licensed Practical Nurses, Pennsylvania Practical Nurse Law, etc.) which establish the ethical standard for the nursing profession.
- Legal: Operates within the scope of practice and standards of care related to the student nurse role.
- Safety: Prevents or minimizes risks for physical, psychological, or emotional jeopardy, injury, or damage.
- Civility: All students in the nursing program are expected to contribute to a positive learning environment. Students are expected to be respectful and empathetic to classmates, instructors, and college and clinical staff. If overwhelmed or stressed, the student takes time out to put things in perspective.
