




FINANCIAL SNAPSHOT

TOTAL LIABILITIES & NET ASSETS

The Pennsylvania Institute of Technology showcased strong financial performance for the fiscal year July 1, 2023 – June 30, 2024. With total assets of \$13,221,267 and liabilities of \$334,496, net assets without donor restrictions reached \$12,686,771. Revenue totaled \$13,419,510, with expenses of \$10,973,406, reflecting careful resource management. These figures highlight our commitment to financial stability and ongoing investment in student success and institutional growth.

This year, our Nursing Department, in partnership with multiple local agencies, conducted a comprehensive mass casualty training event simulating a building collapse scenario. This vital initiative provided P.I.T.'s Level 4 Licensed Practical Nursing (LPN) students with hands-on experience, equipping them to manage real-life emergencies that often strain local healthcare resources.

A mass casualty incident (MCI) is defined as an event where the number of casualties exceeds the capacity of local healthcare facilities within a short period. To bring this scenario to life, P.I.T. nursing students collaborated with emergency responders and local agencies, ensuring an authentic and educational experience. The benefits of this collaboration included enhanced practical skills, improved teamwork, strengthened critical thinking, and heightened emergency preparedness.

During the exercise, nursing students conducted triage, provided initial medical care, and prioritized patients, translating classroom knowledge into action in a dynamic, real-world environment. This high-pressure simulation fostered interprofessional collaboration among nursing students, emergency responders, and law enforcement. The experience sharpened decision-making skills and better-prepared participants to respond effectively to real-life emergencies, ultimately bolstering community safety and resilience.

Community members from Delaware County and beyond gathered at the Pennsylvania Institute of Technology on Saturday, December 2nd, for an impactful Opioid Community Awareness and Education event. The gathering aimed to shed light on the ongoing opioid crisis and provide valuable resources to the community. Attendees had the opportunity to engage with a panel of five speakers who discussed critical topics, including the importance of addressing social determinants of health within the opioid crisis, relapse prevention strategies, the current state of the epidemic, and the local efforts in Delaware County to support and treat individuals affected by opioid and substance use disorders.

The panel featured representatives from Mirmont Treatment Center, MVP Recovery, The Shevlin Family Foundation, and an expert researcher from The University of Delaware, offering a well-rounded perspective on this pressing issue.

Following the panel discussion, a lively question-and-answer session allowed attendees to engage directly with the experts. The event concluded with a Narcan training session led by P.I.T. nursing instructors, who demonstrated how to administer Narcan in an overdose situation. Participants received free Narcan kits, fentanyl test strips, and information about local support resources for individuals and families affected by opioid use disorder.

This essential community event was made possible by a generous grant from the Delaware County Council and the Delaware County Opioid Task Force through the Opioid Settlement Fund, underscoring a collective commitment to addressing this critical public health crisis.
