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PRESIDENT'S LETTER



Dear Friends of P.I.T.,

This year has been one of growth, momentum, and purpose at Pennsylvania Institute of Technology. As I reflect on 2024 to 2025, I am struck not only by the numbers, but by the lives behind them.

Over the past five years, enrollment has grown from 906 students to 1,656 students, an 83% increase. That growth is not accidental. It reflects a deep and intentional commitment to accessible, career-focused education that meets students where they are and prepares them for meaningful work in high-demand careers. Behind every stat is a story. It is the Level 4 nursing student participating in a mass casualty simulation to prepare for real world emergencies. It is a first-generation student balancing work, family, and coursework. It is an adult learner returning to school to build a new future. It is a graduate like Saigon Crosswell or Patricia Combs, whose perseverance and ambition embody the very best of P.I.T.

This year also marked an important milestone in academic growth. During 2024 to 2025, when Crozer Hospital closed, we were able to absorb its 50-year-old Neurodiagnostic Technology program. What began as a transition has quickly become a success story. The program has not only stabilized but has grown and thrived, expanding opportunity for students while meeting a critical workforce need in our region.

Our financial strength continues to position us well for the future. With total assets surpassing \$22 million and strong operating performance this fiscal year, we remain committed to responsible stewardship and strategic investment. These resources allow us to expand programs, enhance facilities, and increase direct support for students.

We awarded more than \$277,500 in scholarships to 177 students. We launched the Student C.A.R.E. Center to ensure no student must choose between education and essential daily needs. Through Delco Gives, our Awards Gala, and the generosity of foundations, corporations, alumni, and community members, we strengthened the philanthropic foundation that makes our mission possible.

Perhaps most visibly, we broke ground on a transformative \$7.4 million renovation project, supported by a \$3.927 million gift from the Walter R. Garrison Foundation. The new Walter R. Garrison College of Nursing and Gateway to Success projects will expand our ability to educate the next generation of professionals while creating welcoming spaces for connection and community.

I am especially excited for the coming year. In late summer, we will celebrate the grand opening of these newly renovated spaces, marking a significant moment in P.I.T.'s evolution. We are also preparing to launch a new Registered Nursing program, expanding academic pathways for nurses who are ready to advance their credentials and careers. These initiatives reflect our commitment to growth that is thoughtful, mission driven, and responsive to workforce demand.

Today, we remain unapologetically focused on workforce readiness, personalized education, and student support. Our average student is not traditional in age or circumstance, but they are extraordinary in determination. It is our responsibility to match that determination with opportunity. None of this progress happens in isolation. I am grateful to our Board of Trustees, chaired by Dr. James P. Capolupo, faculty, staff, donors, clinical partners, and community supporters. Most importantly, I am proud of our students, whose courage to begin, persist, and complete their education inspires us every day.

With cranes in the air, new programs launching, and students stepping forward to Pursue their Dreams, this is not just growth. It is transformation in motion.



Pennsylvania Institute of Technology showcased strong financial performance for the fiscal year July 1, 2024 – June 30, 2025. With total assets of \$22,128,377 and liabilities of \$1,344,498, net assets without donor restrictions reached \$16,646,524. Revenue totaled \$16,911,053, with expenses of \$12,994,039, reflecting careful resource management. These figures highlight our commitment to financial stability and ongoing investment in student success and institutional growth.

EVENT HIGHLIGHTS

MASS CASUALTY INCIDENT & DISASTER TRAINING

In December 2024 and June 2025, our Nursing Department, in partnership with multiple local agencies, conducted two comprehensive mass casualty training events. In December, the simulation involved a chemical spill, and in June, a train derailment. This vital initiative provided P.I.T.'s Level 4 Licensed Practical Nursing (LPN) students with hands-on experience, equipping them to manage real-life emergencies that often strain local healthcare resources.

A mass casualty incident (MCI) is defined as an event where the number of casualties exceeds the capacity of local healthcare facilities within a short period. To bring this scenario to life, P.I.T. nursing students collaborated with emergency responders and local agencies, ensuring an authentic and educational experience. The benefits of this collaboration included enhanced practical skills, improved teamwork, strengthened critical thinking, and heightened emergency preparedness.

During the exercise, nursing students conducted triage, provided initial medical care, and prioritized patients, translating classroom knowledge into action in a dynamic, real-world environment. This high-pressure simulation fostered interprofessional collaboration among nursing students, emergency responders, and law enforcement. The experience sharpened decision-making skills and better prepared participants to respond effectively to real-life emergencies, ultimately bolstering community safety and resilience.

CANNABIS STUDIES STUDENT AND CO-SALUTATORIAN

A longtime resident of the Rose Tree Media area (except for a two-year period living abroad in London, England), she recently became a Florida resident, looking forward to new adventures in a new state. Patricia has been married for 31 years and is the proud mother of four children, ages 19 to 26, as well as two beloved dogs.

Her academic journey began at Lehigh University, where she earned a B.S. in Business and Economics with a major in Accounting. She went on to become a Certified Public Accountant, spending 25 years in the industry working for a local CPA firm. It was her business background that first sparked her interest in the cannabis industry — watching how legalization evolved across the country, she was intrigued by the business implications of the growing cannabis market. Student C.A.R.E. Center Ribbon Cutting

The power to transform lives and jumpstart careers is rooted in education.

The center provides free personal care products and baby items to students in need, ensuring no one has to choose between their education and life challenges.

Groundbreaking Ceremony for Historic College Expansion

On December 5th, 2025, P.I.T. held a groundbreaking ceremony with college leadership, alumni, faculty and staff, community stakeholders and elected officials to celebrate the beginning of a \$7.4 million renovation and modernization project for new spaces of learning and connection.

In December 2024, P.I.T. received a \$3.927 million gift from Walter R. Garrison Foundation to enhance the college's educational facilities and further its mission to provide outstanding learning experiences.

The 15,000 square foot improvement project, with construction now underway, includes new state-of-the-art classrooms and laboratories for the Walter R. Garrison College of Nursing, a new entryway and multi-purpose community hub called Walter R. Garrison Gateway to Success, and renovation of administration offices.

"These new spaces will allow us to prepare more skilled nurses for our community," said Matt Meyers, president of P.I.T.

When this project is complete, there will be new spaces to learn, connect and grow for everyone to enjoy. The future is bright!

"This is a new chapter in P.I.T. and a reminder that our best days lie ahead," Meyers said.

Mass casualty drill helps give participants 'muscle memory'

UPPER PROVIDENCE — A mass casualty drill was held at the Pennsylvania Institute of Technology on Wednesday, May 11, to help students and staff prepare for a potential disaster. The drill, which was organized by the local emergency services, involved a simulated train wreck at the campus.
