Course Highlights

ENG325 THE AMERICAN SHORT STORY IN THE 20TH-CENTURY

This course will examine the evolution of American cultures and values through the literary short story. Students will read a variety of short stories, transitioning through the material in chronological order. The readings will illustrate how traditional American beliefs interact with and reflect national and international historical change. Along with the chronology, the course will examine the transition from naturalism to modernism to postmodernism.

HIS318 HISTORY AND POLITICS OF RHYTHM & BLUES

The Blues is one of the most important and influential musical genres of the past 200 years. This course examines the intersection of music, social justice, slavery, worker rights, and the American prison system. We will look into how the blues shaped the conversation around these topics in America and how the music of the Blues was shaped by the nation.

PLS306 GLOBAL POLITICS AND CLIMATE CHANGE

This course examines the connections between global politics and climate change. Beginning with an analysis of the environmental legacies of the 20th Century, it explores the politicization of the natural environment, the role of science in this process, and the gradual shifts to climate change and more.
